Local giving for local needs



The past year has been one of enormous challenge - for our donors, for the many voluntary groups we support, and for Somerset Community Foundation itself - as economic conditions reduce the ability of both individuals and institutions to give to charities at precisely the moment of greatest need.

It is a tribute therefore to our many supporters that during the year we were able to increase our grant-making and our Endowment Fund. I would particularly like to place on the record my huge appreciation of the efforts of our staff for achieving so much in such difficult circumstances and to my fellow trustees for their wise counsel and continued support, as well as, of course, to everyone who has supported the Foundation in cash and in kind.

One of our highlights was the "Surviving Winter" appeal. It was a new approach for the Foundation but one that had a direct and immediate impact on people facing hardship during last winter with the backing of over 300 donors. You can read more about this initiative on page 10.

Business is not only the engine of economic activity but also it can be a major driver of social change. To date some 29 businesses, trusts and individuals have become Somerset Guardians, contributing £1000 or more each year, in cash or in kind, to support the Foundation's work. Our target is to double this number during the forthcoming year.

We must make every effort to increase our Endowment, our legacy to future generations of Somerset people. We will continue to explore every avenue to increase our grant making - this is our prime role on which many disadvantaged people and the groups who support them depend. We must also continue to find new ways to make a difference - in an age of austerity our power of convening may be as powerful as our financial contribution.

One example of how we have started to develop different roles is our "Raising Aspirations" programme which, at its heart, is about connecting students in secondary schools with people in work who can act as mentors to help everyone in our schools realise their full potential. This may be about academic success but equally it may be about developing other practical and life skills. See page 8 for more information.

Community Foundations are all about harnessing the resources in our communities to bring about positive and lasting change. 2010/11 is, perhaps, the year that saw Somerset Community Foundation really begin to fulfil its potential.

In these 12 months we have awarded 211 grants worth over £382,000 to meet immediate needs and we almost doubled our endowment from £1.1million to £2million ensuring support is in place for future generations.

Nothing could happen without the generosity of those willing to give money to those who have the time, skills, and determination to make a positive difference in the lives of those less fortunate. There is something special about making a difference on your own doorstep and it is our great privilege to be the catalyst for change.

We are now moving into an era when we will be delivering bespoke philanthropic services to multiple fund holders and finding new ways for many more people to give locally: the Surviving Winter, Raising Aspirations and Localgiving.com projects are just the start.

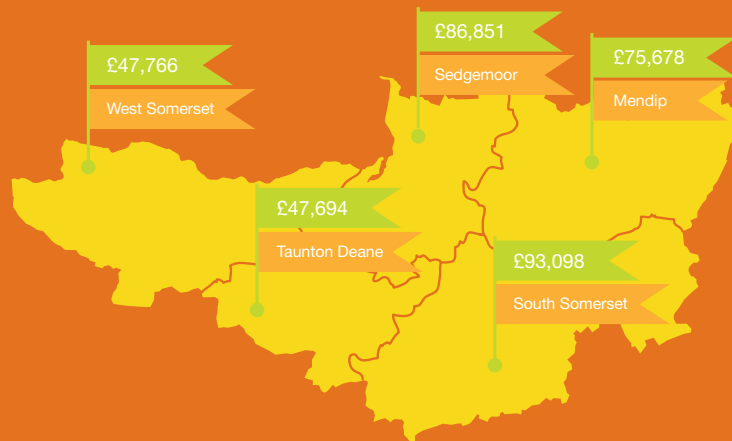


Over the past year we have continued to support a large number of small voluntary organisations throughout Somerset, tackling some of the most difficult issues people in our communities face.

In total we distributed £382,859 in grants to local charities, community groups and individuals reaching throughout Somerset. Our average grant to organisations was just over £2,000. Many of the groups received support from the Foundation for the first time. By the end of March 2011 we had awarded over 900 grants worth almost £2.9 million since 2002. This track record means that we have unique experience of reaching and funding grassroots organisations in Somerset.

Where did our funding go?

We always aim to spread our funding as evenly as we can across the county, and our track record since 2002 reflects this. Following a relatively low number of applications from Sedgemoor in 2009/10 we saw an increase in 2010/11. The map below shows the funding that went to help local people in each district. Grants worth £31,772 were also distributed to projects working across the county.



Who did we help?

The allocation of grants reflect our key priority areas of helping children and young people and older people, while maintaining support to a range of other groups and projects as well.



The Foundation's exceeded beyond my wildest expectations. When I was first approached to set up a Named Fund I thought it was a very simple way for us to channel money through to the sort of organisations we wanted to support. What I was not expecting, and has been fantastic, has been how the Foundation has been able to help and advise the recipient how they can get more funding and with networking. Over the past three years we have seen the Foundation continue to grow, both in terms of our Endowment and our grant-making.

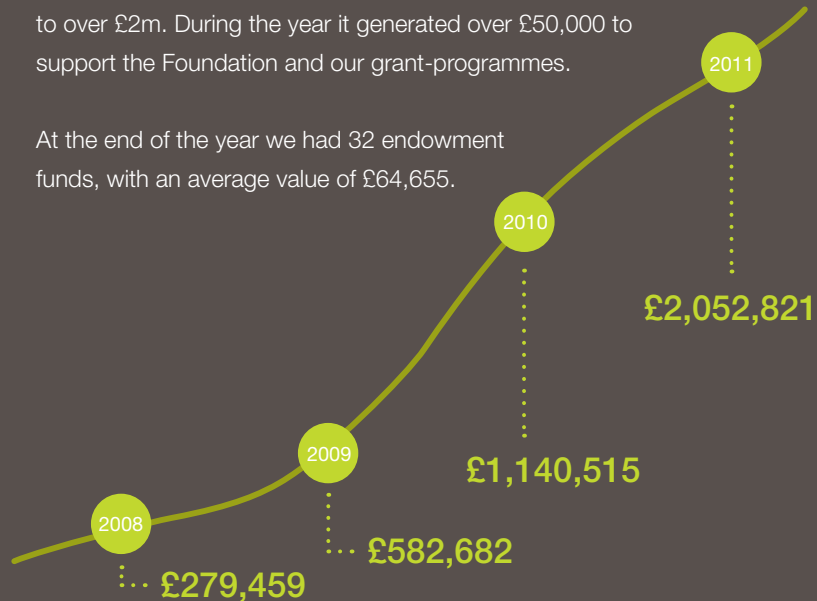
In 2010/11 we increased our income from £1.28m to £1.64m and our charitable expenditure grew from £421k to £468k, including the delivery of our grant programmes, our Raising Aspirations initiative and the support provided to the Bernard Herridge Trust.

Growth of SCF Endowment Fund

Since 2006 our Endowment Fund has grown from £1.1m to over £2m. During the year it generated over £50,000 to support the Foundation and our grant-programmes.

At the end of the year we had 32 endowment funds, with an average value of £64,655.

Focus: Raising Aspirations

Many of Somerset's pupils are missing out on opportunities to fulfil their potential. Over the past few years it is true that our GCSE results have been improving but at a slower rate than national averages.

We have responded with our "Raising Aspirations" programme, with support from the Ninesquare Trust, which has two core elements:

Mentoring Programme

Forming a partnership with Crispin School in Street, we have recruited over 40 mentors from the local business and wider community to help pupils through their school career, giving them support and guidance to help them succeed in whatever path they choose to follow. The effectiveness of this approach is being professionally monitored by the University of East London.

Grants Programme

We are targeting many of our grants around projects that help young people and adults access opportunities, either directly funding activities or by helping them overcome barriers, such as poor transport in rural areas.

In 2010 we were approached by one of our donors offering to donate an amount equivalent to his Winter Fuel Payment if we could use it to help someone less fortunate the following winter. From this simple idea grew the Surviving Winter appeal, which has now become a nationwide initiative led by 46 Community Foundations.

With one of the highest rates of winter-related deaths in the UK and growing numbers of elderly people living in fuel poverty, there was a desperate need for additional funding to help the most vulnerable. By the time we launched at the end of October over 100 people had pledged to donate their Winter Fuel Payment to us and by the end of January over 300 people had made donations worth over £54,000, many adding gift aid on top of that.

By working with Age UK Somerset, Citizen Advice Bureaux in Mendip and Taunton, the Frome Selwood Rotary Club and a number of other local charities we distributed funds to help 220 individuals. We also supported vital 'handyman' services to provide emergency repairs over the winter.

Hundreds of small charities and local community groups, run by thousands of volunteers, are dedicated to helping older people, people with health problems and their carers in Somerset. The help, the support and the friendship they bring to those who need a helping hand is truly invaluable.

This year 38% of our funding - 63 grants worth over £133,000 - went to projects in these categories. Here are just some of the different ways we have been able to help in 2010/11:

Staying active - we funded **Project Tai Chi** to introduce sessions in care homes and sheltered housing across the county, and **Sugar Water Curls** in Sedgemoor to provide weekly dance classes for the over 50s.

Getting out and about - the **Good Fellowship Club** in Yeovil were able to organise transport for members with special needs with our help, while **WHEELS** in West Somerset have been able to expand their community car scheme to reach more people living in isolated areas.

Independence - the **Taunton Deane Association for Neighbourhood Care** has continued to provide gardening and maintenance services in the Borough, and the **Malthouse Court Residents Association** have provided IT training to elderly residents.

Reducing loneliness and isolation - the **Phoenix Carers Group** in the Blackdown Hills provide support to those providing care to loved ones in their own homes, while **Positive Action on Cancer** in Frome continue to provide counselling sessions for those affected by cancer in the area.



The combination of beautiful countryside and strong communities means growing up in Somerset is a great experience for most young people. Charities and other voluntary groups work alongside parents and schools to make sure young children and teenagers stay safe, keep active and able to fulfil their full potential.

They also provide a safety net to those who have a more difficult and troubled start to their lives, helping them to get back on track. In 2010/11 36% of our funding was targeted at helping children and young people. Here are some examples of the 53 projects we funded in this category:

Staying safe - Homestart in Bridgwater give support to families with young children from vulnerable backgrounds, while the King Alfred Boxing Club runs talks on the dangers of smoking, drinking and anti-social behaviour alongside their training schedule.

Giving support - CHALISS in Glastonbury provides counselling to young people experiencing bullying, family breakdowns or bereavements, and the Somerset Rural Youth Project have run a mobile health clinic for teenagers around the county.

Developing potential - CLOKS is a community theatre based in Chard giving children and young people a taste of life on the stage, while the Outdoor Challenge project gave young people from Bridgwater the chance to experience an adventure in the wild!

There has been enormous growth in online donations over the past few years, with hundreds of millions of pounds being given in this way. Small charities and unregistered voluntary groups rarely benefit from this boom, yet we know many donors would prefer to give locally given the chance.



Localgiving.com is a national initiative which is being led locally by Somerset Community Foundation. It gives small grassroots charities the opportunity to set up a simple webpage and receive online donations. Crucially it gives donors the chance to search geographically for projects in the areas they want to support, on their doorstep.

Every organisation on the site is vetted by the Foundation which will give donors confidence that they are giving to well-run groups. Donations come through the Foundation and we ensure that gift aid is collected and passed on to local organisations. In short it is a very efficient way to give and to receive local donations.

We started to add local groups to the site in August 2011, and our goal is to get at least 100 up and running in the first 12 months. This will give donors - individuals, local businesses and trusts - a far better range of options to channel their giving locally.
