About Us

Somerset Community Foundation is a charity that helps passionate people in Somerset change the world on their doorstep by funding local charities and inspiring local giving and philanthropy.

We aim to build stronger communities in Somerset where everyone has the opportunity to thrive. We provide rewarding and impactful ways for donors to give through us to the causes and places they care about most. Together, we fund amazing organisations and the passionate people that change lives every day.

Since we were founded in 2002 we've awarded more than £15 million in funding, changing thousands of lives across Somerset.

arch 2020 marked the beginning of a course of events that would reshape our lives and communities in ways that none of us could ever have imagined. As concern about the coronavirus outbreak grew, it became clear that the impending lockdown would have wide-ranging impacts on everyone's lives – but that the most significant impacts would be on those already facing their own challenges.

With this in mind, we launched our Somerset Coronavirus Appeal on 19th March, just a few days before the first national lockdown was announced. Our first grants were made shortly afterwards to food banks across the county, and we continued making emergency grants to frontline charities every day in those first few weeks.

What was truly remarkable to see was the pace at which our voluntary sector responded. Almost overnight, our nimble, innovative local charities transformed the way they deliver their services. Food banks started delivering food parcels to people at home. People struggling with their mental health could access free counselling over Zoom. Young people could join virtual youth clubs and older people could join sing-a-longs and social clubs from their living rooms. One village even set up and stocked a pop-up community shop in less than a week so local people could access essential supplies on their doorstep.

Thanks to the support of so many generous donors, we were privileged to play a leading role in our county's response to the pandemic. Powered by more than £1.5m of flexible funding we've received from individuals, businesses, charitable trusts and public sector partners, we've made over £1.1m of grants to date* to over 350 charities. And in the months ahead we'll continue to award even more grants as we help charities recover from the financial impacts of the pandemic.

I'm especially grateful to the many local charities, funders and partners who have shared invaluable data and insights with us to inform our grant making, and helped us make the most impact possible.

We are so lucky to live in a county where so many give back. A county where thousands of hardworking charity staff and willing volunteers join together with those giving funding, food, laptops, baby clothes and so much more. Together, your generosity means our most vulnerable neighbours have been cared for and supported through these most difficult of times.

I hope you enjoy reading more about the incredible work of our local charities over the last year. I find it truly inspirational and I'm sure you will, too.

Our emergency response

Our unique role in the local response to the pandemic was to give local charities the funding they needed to reach the most vulnerable people in our communities, as quickly as possible. We knew the need would be huge. And we knew from our experience supporting our communities through the floods in 2012/13 and 2014/15 that the best way we could do that was to launch a public appeal.

We were blown away by the response. We were immensely grateful to local charitable trusts and Somerset County Council for giving us significant funding within the first two weeks which enabled us to make our earliest grants. We were also delighted to benefit from funding from the National Emergencies Trust's national appeal and our gratitude goes out to our existing donors who allowed us the flexibility to swiftly redirect their funds to wherever they were needed most.





Locally, support came from all sides of our community – individual donors, local businesses, sports clubs, churches, local children, and enthusiastic fundraisers undertaking daring, creative and gruelling challenges to raise money for the appeal. A true community effort and one we can all be proud of.

Providina a vapid response

As the severity of the coronavirus outbreak became clear, on 19 March 2020, just days before the country's first lockdown, we launched the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal. Generous support came from local individuals, businesses, charitable trusts and public sector partners, as well as significant funding from a national appeal run by the National Emergencies Trust (NET).

Within two weeks, we'd made 50 grants worth £120,000, providing urgent support to help local foodbanks and community groups to continue or adapt their vital work, supporting the most vulnerable in our communities across the county. In this first, emergency phase, grants were awarded within days, providing flexible funding and prioritising food distribution and deliveries and support for those shielding, such as older people or people with disabilities. We also funded lots of digital change for local charities, who showed huge creativity and dedication, transforming their services to take them online, often within a matter of days.

In the first 10 weeks of the Appeal, two thirds of all grant applications were funded within five days – a huge departure from our usual timescales and ways of working, but one we knew was essential to quickly get funds where they were needed.

CASE STUDY: TAUNTON SCRUBBERS

Taunton Scrubbers was formed to help address the chronic shortage of PPE the NHS and other care providers experienced during the start of the coronavirus outbreak. The small army of volunteer makers put their sewing skills to fantastic use to support community health workers in and around Taunton and beyond.

Susan McDonnell told us how the £2,500 grant to purchase much-needed fabric helped support local NHS staff.

"There was a shortage of scrubs and PPE for a number of reasons, but due to the coronavirus outbreak it was simply that more people needed to wear them; they were changing their scrubs up to three times a day. There was a ten-fold increase in the need for scrubs, and a decrease in the number of deliveries, as they had to be quarantined before they could be used.

All types of community health workers required them, such as the Somerset NHS Trust, hospitals, GPs, care homes and mental health units.

In late March I posted on Facebook, asking if any sewers were interested in getting involved. The group started doubling every two days until we got to around 1,000 members: our youngest was 6 years old and our oldest was 91.

I soon found myself running a big organisation from my living room, with delivery support from the local driving school and other local people who had been furloughed. We also made scrubs wash bags, headbands to protect the skin behind the ears, operation gowns and scrubs caps. It took our fastest sewers around 90 minutes to make a set of scrubs, but for most people it took the best part of a day. Local people and businesses donated all kinds of fabric – curtains, quilt covers, sheets, tablecloths, as well as actual dress-making fabric.



At one point we had around 700 volunteers making up to 600 sets of scrubs a day, with another 100 or so people helping in other ways; at the peak we were out delivering every day."

As sets of scrubs and PPE started arriving in the country, the urgency and demand gradually declined.

"The problem was stopping people sewing! We delivered over 15,000 items in total, including around 3,000 sets of scrubs. More recently we made Christmas scrubs for children's wards and we've also helped our local hospice who were affected by delayed deliveries."



CASE STUDY: HIGHBRIDGE AREA FOODBANK

In April 2020, Highbridge Area Foodbank was just one of the county's foodbanks to receive an emergency grant from our Coronavirus Response and Recovery Fund. The foodbank usually provides food parcels to around 2000 people every year affected by food poverty, however, demand for their services rocketed since the coronavirus outbreak, and we provided an urgent grant to help the group transform its approach to offer safe home deliveries of food parcels three times a week.

We spoke to Maxine Bashford, Trustee of the foodbank, who told us how they supported local people in need in the early days of the pandemic.

"In mid-April 2020, our foodbank centres fed three times the amount of people we fed in the same week the previous year. We saw a rise in those moving into temporary accommodation, waiting to secure benefits, people being laid off and of course those who were previously just about coping but, due to the financial impact of this crisis, were no longer able to do so.

I spoke to elderly people who were isolating and scared because their food was running out and there's no one to help, and vulnerable adults whose regular framework of support had, in their terms, disappeared. I spoke to a mother of several children who suddenly lost her job and found herself totally at a loss. She visited us at Easter and was hugely grateful for the food parcel she received. We also managed to include an Easter Egg for each child which reduced her to tears.

No one can know the real impact that receiving a couple of bags of food can have on someone who is hungry. For some people it's the food that really matters, for others it's that they mean enough to be helped."

Comparing April 2020 – January 2021 to the same period in the previous year, Highbridge Area Foodbank have seen a 59% increase in referrals to the foodbank and the amount of people they have fed has increased by 34%.

"There is now much more food support, over and above that which we provide here at the foodbank. Various organisations, such the Village Agents, are providing food so it's probable the overall level of need is greater than our figures alone would suggest.

We expect the level of need to continue to rise in line with the expected worsening economic situation once the full financial effects of the pandemic and other economic factors are seen."

Living with coronavirus

By early July 2020 we had awarded £500,000 to 170 Somerset groups, and our approach to grant funding had evolved in line with what local charities told us they needed. We started to provide a blend of different types of grants to help local charities and community groups respond to the more wide-ranging social impacts of the coronavirus outbreak.

This saw us support charities working with diverse groups across the county, from online youth clubs and counselling services, to charities delivering activities for people with disabilities or reducing isolation in older people. Many charities started to feel the financial impacts as many fundraising events and activities were unable to go ahead, so we began to provide flexible core funding to help offset those losses, ensuring they could keep up with surging demand, and adapt their infrastructure to deliver their work in a Covid-secure way.

By the end of July 2020, the funds raised by the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal had grown to a staggering £1 million.

Reminiscence Learning specialise in dementia care, reminiscence and activities. Fiona Mahoney from the charity told us how a grant from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal helped them to continue providing remote support sessions for people with dementia and their carers during the pandemic, in the summer of 2020.

"Due to the lockdown we had to put a stop to practically all our projects and swiftly reinvent the wheel. Our centre temporarily closed and we adapted our services as best we could to remotely reach our clients in their homes. Like so many other charities, the situation had a very negative impact on our income and fundraising opportunities. However, throughout this, we've learnt that we're very resilient and adaptable, reshaping almost all of our services and at a rapid speed, learning many new skills – mainly digital and IT based – in the process! We're very proud of the teams' efforts and hard work through this very challenging period.

Once the first lockdown was announced we knew we had to do whatever we could to continue supporting our clients and family carers. We started by offering them twice weekly care calls from different staff, especially important for those of our clients who are less technologically minded. What we didn't expect was the amount of people we would reach with our new live 'Activity @ Home' Facebook sessions. In the first few weeks we were reaching over 11,900 people across 20 countries – increasing our profile by 900%.



Our clients and family carers have felt very isolated and alone during the lockdowns, and we constantly strive to be a lifeline for many who are vulnerable and have no one else.

One of our family carers and her husband, who lives with dementia, have benefitted hugely from the services we have been able to offer as a result of the funding from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal. She accessed our online sessions every single day, twice a day, and they both enjoyed – and continue to enjoy – the activities on offer, from cooking and baking to chair-based exercises and quizzes. She told us that because of the live sessions she never felt fully on her own with her husband; they have felt supported and safe, and she structures her day and routine around the sessions."

The latest funding from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal will support Fiona and the team at Reminiscence Learning to deliver a Forest School for younger people with dementia and memory impairment.

"As well as running our Forest School, our intergenerational dementia awareness project, The Archie Project, is planned for late 2021, when we hope we'll be able to link local primary school pupils with care home residents, alongside other members of the community. The ultimate aim is to reduce the fear and stigma often associated with dementia and create more dementia-friendly communities."



CASE STUDY: TAUNTON & DISTRICT MENCAP SOCIETY

Taunton & District Mencap Society support people with a learning disability and their families and carers in Taunton and the surrounding area. They provide a range of services, including round-the-clock care, advice and information on things like employment and education, and help with living independently for the first time.

When we spoke to Dave Urwin, Development Officer, in June 2020, he told us how their £2,000 grant from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal helped the team to make sure their self-isolating service users were able to stay in contact with each other during lockdown.

"Since the lockdown, we'd been unable to continue our normal programme of activities and trips. Our members are adults with learning disabilities and some of them have physical disabilities too. During the pandemic we've had to adapt our work so that we can engage with them remotely, mostly via Facebook and Zoom.

The Somerset Coronavirus Appeal grant allowed us to pay towards the salary costs of our two staff, easing the pressure of fundraising and allowing us to focus more on providing the best service that we can for our members during these difficult times.

The social distancing measures meant that people with learning difficulties, who thrive through being able to socialise and having activities to keep them occupied, have become isolated, and the break to their usual routine is difficult to cope with. But we were able to adapt what we do to make sure that important interaction was still there, and the Zoom bingo and quizzes that we put on were a big hit across the board.

Some of our members hadn't seen their friends in a long time, so there were always big smiles all around when they got to see each other on screen."

We recently caught up with Dave for an update: "Between lockdowns we did manage to host one socially distanced quiz in a village hall, and a treasure hunt in a local park, but since then our activities have gone back to being online.

We'll keep providing activities and socialisation for our members in different ways, including creating some artwork which we plan to unveil at a virtual art exhibition in the summer of 2021. It's difficult in this current climate to continue bringing in the necessary funds to cover the running costs of our charity. However, our most recent grant from SCF for core costs means we know that this side of things is covered for the next quarter, giving us more time to focus on supporting our members rather than raising funds."





No one knows for certain what the future holds for charities in 2021 and beyond. The pandemic has significantly impacted on normal fundraising activities like fun runs, charity dinners and coffee mornings, and many groups are struggling financially. With hope on the horizon with the rollout of the vaccination programme, we want to help local charities to build greater resilience into their organisations to help keep our sector strong for many more years to come.

Since the outbreak, the Foundation has funded grassroots charities and organisations who have proved themselves invaluable during this time of crisis. They have shown they have the ability to respond creatively, rapidly and in an innovative way, underpinned by their expert knowledge within their communities. We have seen that some of the most resourceful groups have found new and improved ways of working since the pandemic, adapting their approach almost overnight to enable them to continue their work and, in many cases, expand their reach and become more inclusive.

We are extremely proud to support these charities and will do everything we can in the years to come to help them, not just to survive but to thrive. Working together, and powered by the support of our donors, we want to build stronger communities that create brighter and better futures for everyone in Somerset.

Escapeline was founded to meet the needs of children and young people in Somerset who have been exploited by criminal County Lines gangs, whose practice of trafficking drugs into rural areas, away from major cities, has increased substantially in the last year. The National Crime Agency suggests that there are approximately 50,000 young people involved in County Lines gang activity across England.

Escapeline provides counselling and support directly to victims and their parents or carers, educational programmes to raise awareness of the dangers among the general school population, and training for professionals working with young people.

We spoke to CEO Lisa Hooper who told us how two grants from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal have helped the charity:

"When the pandemic first hit, we needed to quickly adapt our services. With the emergency grants from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal we were soon able to set up and provide virtual support for young people exploited by County Lines gangs.

Thanks to our first grant, we were able to continue, develop and expand our service during this difficult time. We set up a telephone support service for parents whose children were being exploited by criminal gangs – because parents are victims too; they've lost their child and they desperately need that support. It's about educating the parents, too, to make them more aware of what's going on out there.

During the coronavirus crisis there has been an immense increase in County Lines gangs operating in Somerset, with well over 30 gangs now operating here. Gangs are targeting deprived neighbourhoods, seeking out vulnerable young people, possibly those with learning difficulties or those who are marginalised due to their race or background, and enticing them with gifts and cash. This increase in criminal activity far outweighs the resources the police and local authorities can provide to combat the problem. As a result we've seen a large increase of young people being referred to us, as well as an increase in demand for our work.



We've adapted our service to offer virtual, online training and assemblies where possible. Our latest grant will help to cover the loss of income normally generated from face-to-face training, which has been restricted due to the coronavirus. It will fund our core costs over the coming months, giving us the flexibility to manage the day-to-day running of the charity, our staff and volunteers, and deliver training to professionals and at school assemblies in the future."



CASE STUDY: WINCANTON WAR MEMORIAL HALL

Wincanton War Memorial Hall is a small charity that has been running for 70 years and provides a local community space for the town and surrounding villages. The facilities are used for a huge range of groups and activities including blood donation sessions, sports groups, children's drama groups, tea dances for older people, the local carers association and the stroke club. It is also a private functions venue for the local community to hire, for events such as birthday parties and wedding receptions.

We spoke to Brian Sales, Chair of the Trustees, who told us how a grant from the Somerset Coronavirus Appeal has helped the hall to replace lost income, ensuring the viability of this valuable community asset for future generations.

"During the lockdowns we've sadly had to close our doors, but we've been able to open on and off for a couple of months having put in a huge amount of work and effort into ensuring we're COVID-safe, and compliant with the Government guidelines.

The hall normally hosts activities every single day of the week – it's a very busy venue! So while our doors are closed groups struggle to meet up. In many cases, such as the local lunch club, it's the only opportunity people have to get out of their homes and meet up with their friends once a week.

The hall, as with other community venues, is a lifeline for so many vulnerable people and in many cases there has been nothing to replace this, since the coronavirus outbreak.

Loneliness is a major issue for lots of our older users, and the activities held at our hall helped to combat those feelings of isolation for so many. Local children have also had to stop attending which could impact on their mental wellbeing.

It's so important that we keep our hall going through the pandemic, so that it's here for the many local people who use it to return to. Since March 2020, we have had a substantially reduced income, but our Somerset Coronavirus Appeal grant will help us to cover the ongoing costs of this much loved and well-used community venue until we are able to open the doors once again."
